An introduction to US 2020 elections

In other U.S. elections, candidates are elected directly by popular vote. But the president and vice president are not elected directly by citizens. Instead, they're chosen by "electors" through a process called the Electoral College. The process of using electors comes from the Constitution. It was a compromise between a popular vote by citizens and a vote in Congress. Each state gets as many electors as it has members of Congress (House and Senate). Including Washington, D.C.'s three electors, there are currently 538 electors in all. Each state's political parties choose their own slate of potential electors. Who is chosen to be an elector, how, and when varies by state.

Detailed introduction to US elections

Step 1: Primaries and Caucuses

People with similar ideas usually belong to the same political party. The two main parties in the U.S. are Republican and Democrat.

Many people want to be President. They campaign around the country and compete to try to win their party's nomination.

In caucuses, party members meet, discuss, and vote for who they think would be the best party candidate.

In primaries, party members vote in a state election for the candidate they want to represent them in the general election.

Step 2: National Conventions and General Election

After the primaries and caucuses, each major party, Democrat and Republican, holds a national convention to select a Presidential nominee.

The party's Presidential nominee announces his or her choice for Vice President.

The Presidential candidates campaign throughout the country to win the support of the general population.

On election day, people in every state cast their vote.

Step 3: The Electoral College

When people cast their vote, they are actually voting for a group of people called electors.

The number of electors each state gets is equal to its total number of Senators and Representatives in Congress. A total of 538 electors form the Electoral College.

Each elector casts one vote following the general election. The candidate who gets 270 votes or more wins.

The newly elected President and Vice President are then inaugurated on January 20th.

The election process begins with primary elections and caucuses. These are two methods that states use to select a potential presidential nominee tooltip. In general, primaries use secret ballots for voting. Caucuses are local gatherings of voters who vote at the end of the meeting for

a particular candidate. Then it moves to nominating conventions, during which political parties each select a nominee to unite behind. During a political party convention, each presidential nominee also announces a vice presidential running mate. The candidates then campaign across the country to explain their views and plans to voters. They may also participate in debates with candidates from other parties.

What is the Role of the Electoral College?

During the general election tooltip, Americans go to their polling place tooltip to cast their vote for president. But the tally of those votes—the popular vote—does not determine the winner. Instead, presidential elections use the Electoral College. To win the election, a candidate must receive a majority of electoral votes. In the event no candidate receives a majority, the House of Representatives chooses the president and the Senate chooses the vice president.

What is a Typical Presidential Election Cycle?

The presidential election process follows a typical cycle:

Spring of the year before an election – Candidates announce their intentions to run.

Summer of the year before an election through spring of the election year – Primary and caucus tooltip debates take place.

January to June of election year – States and parties hold primaries tooltip and caucuses.

July to early September – Parties hold nominating conventions to choose their candidates.

September and October – Candidates participate in presidential debates.

Early November – Election Day

December – Electors tooltip cast their votes in the Electoral College.

Early January of the next calendar year – Congress counts the electoral votes.

January 20 – Inauguration Day

Scenario suggestion in a glance (HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL)

Here, there are some scenarios, categorized by their relevance to the elections schedule:

Main Goal:

Increasing the tensions in order to make the social and political situation insecure, this will be done through talks about an elections fraud between the candidates and showing the elections infrastructures "insecure"

Pre-elections scenarios

- 1: Interrupting the registration process:
- 1.1 DDOS attacks on registration websites.

Goal:

Creating a social sensitivity about the current republican government's efforts to prevent the Democrats from participating in the elections.

Stages:

- 1. DDOS attacks on state registration websites and the states that have a black majority and have a majority of democrat fans.
- 2. Publishing news about the inaccessibility of the registration websites on the news websites that are related to those states. The news will be about "Republican party's efforts to disrupt the registration process in order to take the registration chance away from the democrat states."

Note:

As the American leaders want the lowest turnouts in the elections, the news must be published in a way to push the people to visit the websites and register.

Requirements:

Collecting a list of import news websites of the mentioned states.

Collecting a list of democrat states and the states that have a big number of black people and democrat fans.

Access:

Gaining access from important state news websites for publishing the news

Golden time: The golden time will be the announced period of state registration.

1.2 Defacing the registration websites

Goal:

Creating a social distrust regarding the lack of security in the governmental systems and creating a tension about an unfair competition between the parties.

Stages:

- 1. Defacing the registration websites and publishing content about "Website maintenance or inaccessibility", redirecting white people to another website that we own and infecting the visitors.
- 2. Publishing the news in news websites.

Note: the news content should create a dissatisfaction about the governmental websites as they're not providing the proper service on those "sensitive days"

Requirements:

Preparing the defaced web pages and news content

Access:

Infiltrating the registration websites Infiltrating the news websites

Golden time:

The days that the registration websites are open to the voters.

Second strategy:

Infecting the voting system

Goal:

Creating a wave of civil distrust against the government and its website through infecting the registration websites with malware.

Stages:

- 1. Infecting the registration websites with malware
- 2. Publishing the news about it on effective social networks

Content should be "US government is spying on its citizens through the infrastructure that they used to trust"

Note: These news should be published via influencers, like a software expert, this can be done by registering a user account.

3. Publishing the news on news agencies by quoting posts about "governmental websites being unsafe"

Requirements:

Tools:

Preparing a malware that activates the user's camera, location and their speakers.

Access:

Gaining access to the registration websites for infecting them with the malwares.

Gaining access to the news websites.

Publication:

Creating numerous and reliable accounts on social media like Facebook and Twitter

Golden Time:

During the registration days

3rd Scenario:

showing hateful content at the end of the registration

Goal:

Provoking the racial inequality movements

Stages:

- 1. Infiltrating and gaining access to the registration websites with sensitive content at the end of the registration!
 - Content: "According to the new law, which was passed by President Trump, a white person's vote will be counted as 2 votes by black people"
- 2. Publishing the news with the screenshot attached on social media with high election-related activities.
- 3. Publishing the "passed bill" document on news websites.

Requirements:

Gaining access to the registration websites and news agencies

User accounts:

Creating reliable accounts on Facebook and Twitter

Golden Time: During the registration days

Post-elections scenarios:

Dragging people to the streets for protests
